SESSION NEWS and NOTES

The Session of Clifton Presbyterian Church, Maxwelton, WV, met for the stated July and August meetings on Sunday, July 5th and August 2nd. The July meeting was a conference call meeting and the August meeting was held in the fellowship room of the church with some members attending by telephone.

At both meetings moderator, **Susan Sharp Campbell**, opened with prayer and declared a quorum.
The minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

The financial report for May 2020 was showed the following: The General fund had **expenditures in excess of income of \$1,431.77.** The Balance of the General Fund is \$202,601.08. The Memorial fund received \$1,500 and paid out \$325.00, leaving a balance of \$46,571.98.

The financial report for June 2020 showed the General fund with an **excess income** of **\$5,420.94**. The Memorial fund received \$30.34 and paid out \$260.00 leaving a balance of \$46,342.32. Cents-Ability offering for June was \$113.00. Stone Soup now has a balance of \$2,869.25.

The Clerk reported for the record, the death of long-time member, Claude Stephen (Steve) Malcomb on July 16, 2020. The average worship attendance in the sanctuary for the two months was 18 and well over 350 views on Facebook.

The Session approved from a request form LeAnn Montgomery to allow the Lewisburg Farmer's Market to set up a mobile farmers market in the Clifton parking lot this fall and next spring.

The Session also approved a request from Misty Boggs for use of Clifton's Sanctuary on October 10, 2020 for her wedding.

Jim Miller, Chair of the Property, reported that Buddy Baker's health has improved and he has resumed some of the church's maintenance. Jim has found that the community groups using the park seem to be doing a good job following the rules and cleaning the area. The manse appears to be in good condition following the winter.

Suzy Meadows, Chair of the Christian Education Committee, moved to sponsor a free clothing giveaway prior to back to school on Saturday, August 22nd. This motion was approved. The Christian Education Committee is considering several teaching options (in person, mail outs, phone, etc.) plus possibilities for study materials for the upcoming Sunday School year. No decisions have been made at this time but the committee hopes to place an emphasis on Matthew 25. Due to the ongoing pandemic, the kick-off for Sunday School will probably be delayed until the later part of September.

Larry Davis, Chair of the Mission Committee reported that the Mission Committee had met by Conference Call and approved the following expenditures from the Mission Committee's budget: a \$400 gift to the Family Refuge Center; a \$200 donation to the Lewisburg/Fairlea Food locker; a \$200 donation to the Mountaineer Food Bank in Gassaway, WV; and a \$400 gift to Doctors Without Borders. The Mission Committee also approved a \$400 donation in the form of gift cards to a community member from the Stone Soup Fund.

Lynne Bostic, Chair of the Congregational Care Committee reported that the Congregational Care Committee is working on a Church Directory at this time and considering different ideas for the future.

Venetta Wright, Chair of the Worship Committee reported the Worship Committee met by conference call twice to plan the worship at Clifton. Ventta Wright moved to have "attend in or by car" vesper sevice in Charley Mackey Park on July 15, Aug.12 and Sept.9, 2020. The motion was approved. Lieselottee Heil will perform at the August 12th event in park (fiddle and vocals) and Tim Holbrook will sing at worship from time to time. The session approved the baptism of a grandchild of Brenda Blake--Beau Asher Byrd, son of Barrett and Raelyn Blake Byrd.

Kereshmeh Kashefian, Chair of the Outreach Committee reported at the June meeting that in order to share the Good News around the world, she joined Clifton's Facebook page in different Christian pages. Before this doing this Clifton's Facebook page had 257 "likes" and 278 followers, it now has 357 "likes" and 388 followers. From June 14th through July 5th Clifton's Sunday worship service was viewed by an average of 538 people on Facebook and 9 people on You Tube. People from 22 states and 17 countries saw the Facebook posts. The people we are engaging with on Facebook are mostly 65 and over. The Outreach Committee is always looking for ways to improve Facebook live.

Vespers in the Park JULY-AUGUSTSEPTEMBER

The three vespers in the gazebo area of Charlie Mackey Park were wisely scheduled for three Wednesdays during the 2020 summer of our discontent. These outdoor services in the twilight of the day are perfectly suited to be a respite from the anxiety-generating coronavirus pandemic. Subsequent reading about vespers gave me an appreciation of their role in the life of Christians for centuries.

Services of evening prayers held by Christians originated as early as the fourth century, and the time for them corresponded with sunset. As the dusk begins to fall, there are prayers of thanks for the day and praise to God. The name adopted for them was vespers which comes from the Latin word for evening. Bible readings and singing have also been included. The Presbyterian Church is one Protestant denomination which on occasion continues this practice of having vespers.

Despite the presence of dark clouds covering the sky as the time for vespers on August 12 approached, all was ready in the Charlie Mackey Park gazebo with our pastor and musicians protected from possible rainfall. Eager attendees with their printed descriptions of the service were located in cars forming a semicircle in front of the gazebo. They were ready to sing the hymns without worrying about the possible transmission of the novel coronavirus.

The scene in the park established a particularly peaceful mood for the service. The coming of darkness when most

creatures settle down to rest put our minds at ease. The light rain that had fallen in the late afternoon had created a cleansing, lifegiving, and refreshing aspect to the vespers that evening.

The first vesper service on July 15th was accompanied by a beautiful sunset in the direction of Weavers Knob, and perhaps there will be another on September 9th when we gather again for vespers. On that occasion, the sunset will take place a full 40 minutes earlier than it did on August 12th.

Incidentally, the setting for August 12th vespers brought to my mind the origins of the Presbyterian Church. The green grass, green trees, and grey skies were much like the tree-lined fields around John Knox's childhood home of Haddington near the east coast of Scotland. Likewise, listening to the fiddle music between Ron Miller's readings from the bible reminded me of the bagpipes being played by Don Dransfield at our Scottish Communion services in the picnic shelter for many years. He is shown below on a Sunday in September of 2009 playing his highland pipes as part of the Scottish Communion service on another cloudy day.


